Please find enclosed with this letter your Form I-20 Certificate of Eligibility for Nonimmigrant (F-1) Student Status – For Academic and Language Students.

Canadian citizens are not required to apply for an entry visa at a U.S. Consulate; however, Canadians are subject to all the other immigration regulations relating to F-1 international students who are studying in the United States (i.e. employment in the U.S., full-time course load, and other provisions for maintaining status).

It is **especially** important for Canadian students to be vigilant about entering the United States **in proper F-1 student status**, as immigration inspectors are accustomed to admitting Canadian citizens as visitors. **To enter the U.S. in F-1 student status, Canadians must present the items listed below to the Customs and Border Protection immigration inspector at the port of entry:**

- 1. Original Form I-20, Certificate of Eligibility for Nonimmigrant (F-1) Student Status from Champlain College.
- 2. Pay the U.S. SEVIS I-901 fee and print out the receipt at this link: https://www.fmjfee.com/. You will need to present this receipt at the border This fee is required for ALL international students who want to study in the United States.
- 3. Valid passport (valid at least 6 months beyond intended stay)
- 4. Original letter of acceptance from Champlain College
- 5. Original Champlain College Financial Aid Award Letter
- 6. Original financial documents (originals of the scans you showed for the Initial I-20)
- 7. Official test scores (TOEFL, IELTS, etc)
- 8. Official transcripts and diplomas
- 9. Proof of ties to your home country

After the border official reviews your documents, you will be either given an I-94 Admission/Departure card to complete or just stamp in your passport. Be sure to look at your I-94 card/stamp before you leave the inspection area to ensure that it has the notations "F-1 D/S" written on it. If your I-94 card/stamp does not have "F-1" "D/S", you are considered to be in Visitor (B-2) status, a status which does not permit study in the U.S.

IMPORTANT NOTE: DO NOT plan to enter the United States earlier than 30 days before your program start date indicated on your Form I-20.
